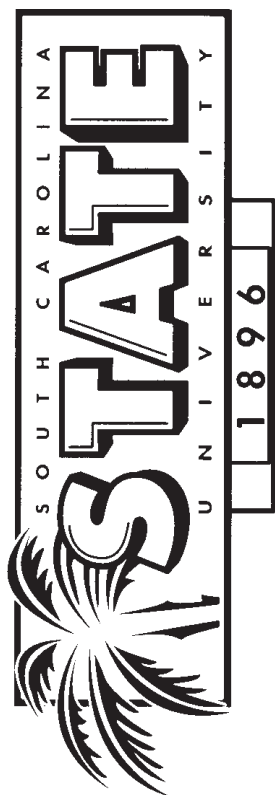

GENERAL INFORMATION

PURPOSE OF THE SUMMER TERM

In keeping with the mission of South Carolina State University, the purposes of the summer term are (1) to provide an opportunity for students to engage in enrichment and/or accelerated courses or programs, (2) to provide an opportunity for educators and allied professionals to pursue advanced degrees or fulfill recertification requirements, and (3) to provide an opportunity for social services and business personnel to pursue professional development courses using the University's traditional or technologically advanced delivery systems.

ADVANTAGES OF ATTENDING SC STATE IN THE SUMMER

Because the summer term at the University encompasses multiple sessions, students find that study during this time has a number of advantages. A student can earn up to fifteen semester credit hours which could possibly result in an early graduation date, in the improvement of a grade point average, in the reduction of a course load during the regular academic year or in the opportunity to get a course of study back on track. A number of obstacles, including distance, that prevent summer school attendance have been removed. Some courses are being offered using interactive video and satellite technology. A variety of courses are offered during the summer term and they are conveniently scheduled to meet the needs and desires of traditional and nontraditional students. Furthermore, visiting students can earn academic credit that will transfer to the degree college, and entering freshmen can get a head start on college courses. Finally, a number of courses are available to persons wishing to renew teaching certificates or to those interested in self-improvement. There is something for everyone on the summer campus at South Carolina State University.

SUMMER FACULTY

Some courses will be taught by regular members of the South Carolina State University faculty who will be in residence during the summer term. In addition, experienced and outstanding professors from other educational institutions throughout the country have also been invited to teach. During the summer sessions, class sizes are smaller and students enjoy the individualized attention and stimulating interaction with the faculty.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT STATUS

Admission to Summer School at South Carolina State University does not imply acceptance as a degree candidate in any of the schools or programs. **The undergraduate students at South Carolina State University are required to preregister for summer school with the chairs of their respective departments. Grades earned in summer school by students on academic probation may be used for the purpose of removing their academic probationary status. Consequently, only those grades earned during the summer at South Carolina State University will be applicable to a change in a student's probationary status.**

- **Transient Students** (Non-South Carolina State University Students) must complete and submit an application form (located near the end of this publication) to the Office of Admissions and Recruitment before admission can be granted, whether the course is to be taken for credit or audit. Applications should be submitted to the Office of Admissions and Recruitment by **April 1, 2011**. In addition, visiting students must secure approval to register for courses at South Carolina State University from the dean and/or chair of the college or university at which they are enrolled full-time.
- **Persons not enrolled in any college or university** must present appropriate credentials to the Office of Admissions and Recruitment. Admission is possible upon the approval of credentials.
- **Persons who wish to be admitted to workshops, conferences, institutes**, or any special program being conducted during the summer term should write directly to the director of the individual program for information.

GENERAL INFORMATION

- **Auditors** (persons not taking courses for credit and who are not subject to examinations) are admitted with the approval of the Office of Admissions and Recruitment. No auditors, however, are accepted for language courses.
- **Graduate Students** must meet the **April 1, 2011** admission deadline for new students. Previously admitted graduate students must file the readmission form along with the summer school application by **April 30, 2011**. (Late applicants should contact the graduate office for emergency assistance.) Graduate students enrolled in degree programs at other institutions, but wishing to take graduate courses at South Carolina State University in a transient status, must be properly admitted by the April deadline.

ALCOHOL AND DRUG POLICY

South Carolina State University promotes a drug-free environment. In this connection, students must be aware that there are policies governing the use and possession of alcohol and drugs on campus. For details of these policies, students should refer to the South Carolina State University Alcoholic Beverage and Drug Policies. Additionally, students need to examine closely the Student Code of Conduct, which details conduct violations, as well as the disciplinary processes and sanctions that may be imposed for violating the code of conduct.

SUMMER REGISTRATION

FINANCIAL AID

Students who wish to be considered for financial aid during the summer must file the 2010-2011 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). In addition, a SC State financial aid application (located at the end of this publication) must be submitted to the Office of Financial Aid. REGISTRATION FOR SUMMER SCHOOL

Early Registration for all students is scheduled for **March 29, 2011** through **April 22, 2011**. Registration for all sessions of summer school is scheduled for, **May 13, 2011**. Session II and Second Three-Week registration will be held on **June 20, 2011**. Tuition and fees for Session I should be paid by **May 19, 2011**. If the registration process has not been completed, schedules will be cancelled after 5:00p.m. on **May 19, 2011**. Tuition and fees for Session II should be paid by **June 24, 2011**. If the registration process has not been completed, schedules will be cancelled after 5:00p.m. on **June 24, 2011**. The late registration period begins on **May 16, 2011** for summer Full Term and Session I; **May 16, 2011** for the Six-week session and the first three-week session; and **June 22, 2011** for Session II and the Second Three-week session.

FOLLOW THE STEPS BELOW TO COMPLETE EARLY REGISTRATION FOR THE SUMMER TERM.

Most of the forms needed to complete the early registration process are located at the end of this booklet.

1. Students with the assistance of academic advisors should review their Course Degree Audit via [Curriculum, Advising, and Program Planning \(CAPP\)](#) in [Bulldog Connection](#) (found under "Registration Tools" under the "Registration tab). Upon completion of the Course Degree Audit, students must obtain their Summer 2011 Alternate PIN from their advisor or department chair. Please refer to page 5 of the Schedule Booklet for Course Registration Steps via Bulldog Connection.

GRADUATE STUDENTS should contact an academic advisor, the appropriate department chair, or the Dean of Graduate Studies for advisement if fully admitted to a degree program. Upon completion of advisement from your academic department, register for classes on [Bulldog Connection](#). Please refer to page 5 of the Schedule Booklet for Course Registration Steps via Bulldog Connection. The School of Graduate Studies is located in Turner Hall-BWing,

Room 205. Conditional students may not register during the early registration period - Contact the Graduate Office for more information (803) 536-7064.

SUMMER REGISTRATION

- Tuition and Fees** may be paid at the Cashier's Office Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m. Students may also view their Bill or pay Tuition and Fees via under "Registration" tab in Bulldog Connection. Be prepared to pay the difference between assessed fees and any financial award. **PAYMENT CANNOT BE DEFERRED DURING THE SUMMER TERM. CASH, MONEY ORDERS, CASHIER'S CHECKS, OR CREDIT CARDS (VISA, OR MASTER CARD) ARE ACCEPTED.**

Upon receipt of your registration materials and payment, the Accounts Receivable Office will process your registration and forward to the Cashier's Office for payment, a receipt will be returned to the student for the paid amount.

- ID cards** for **current South Carolina State University students** are automatically validated when registration has been completed (completed means that **courses have been selected** and that **all fees have been paid**). During the early registration period, **new students** should go to the 2nd Floor of Crawford-Zimmerman, to obtain ID cards.
- Vehicle registration** during the early registration period should be processed at Parking and Vehicle Registration in the basement of the ROTC building (533-3907 or 533-3719).

REGISTRATION PROCESS

Steps for completing registration are outlined on the next page. Please note that most of the forms that are needed to complete registration are located at the end of this booklet.

S U M M E R R E G I S T R A T I O N

1. **Contact your academic advisor for assistance with course selections.** Undergraduate students with the assistance of academic advisors should review their Degree Audit via [Curriculum, Advising, and Program Planning \(CAPP\)](#) on [Bulldog Connection](#) prior to making course selections. **All Undergraduate students must obtain their Summer Alternate Personal Identification Number from their Advisor (Mandatory) to register via "Bulldog Connection"**. Please refer to page 5 of the Schedule Booklet for Course Registration Steps via Bulldog Connection.

Graduate students should see an academic advisor or departmental chair for advisement. If not fully admitted to a degree program, see the Dean of Graduate Studies. **Graduate students must register for courses via Bulldog Connection.** **Non-degree students** must obtain the assigned advisor's signature on the course request form. Course request forms are located at the end of this booklet or in the Graduate Office, Donma Administration Building, Suites 204 and 207, Monday through Friday. Please refer to page 5 of Schedule Booklet for Course Registration Steps via Bulldog Connection.

2. **Assessment.** After final schedules have been obtained, review your Account Summary on "Bulldog Connection" at www.scsu.edu. **Students whose financial aid award covers the total cost of summer tuition and fees may report to classes.**
3. **Pay at Cashier's window.** Once fees have been assessed, report to the Cashier's window, **on the lower level of Crawford Zimmerman Complex, Room 108**, to pay Balance Due.

4. **Register any motor vehicle that is to be parked on campus.** Present the completed Vehicle Registration form to a Cashier located in the Crawford Zimmerman Complex Old Printshop Room 108 and remit the cost of the parking decal. Take the completed form and the receipt to ROTC Building Basement on Goff Avenue from 9:00 a.m.-12 noon and 2:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.



5. **Validate ID Card.** ID Cards for current SC State students are automatically validated when registration has been completed (completed means that courses have been selected and all fees have been paid). ID Cards for new students will be issued during registration at University Computing and Information Technology Services (UCITS) 2nd Floor Crawford-Zimmerman Complex .

NOTE: IF YOU COMPLETE REGISTRATION ON OR BEFORE MAY 16, 2011, AND DO NOT ATTEND SUMMER SCHOOL, PLEASE DROP YOUR SCHEDULE ON BULLDOG CONNECTION. FAILURE TO DROP YOUR SCHEDULE BY THE CLASS START DATE WILL RESULT IN YOU RECEIVING A GRADE OF "F" FOR THE COURSE(S) FOR WHICH YOU ARE ENROLLED. FEES ARE CHARGED AFTER THE CLASS START DATE.

WITHDRAWAL FROM SUMMER SCHOOL

Requests for withdrawal from Summer School must be made on official forms that may be secured from the Registrar's Office. The official date of withdrawal, for the purpose of computing changes and grades, is the documented date the Registrar's Office is notified.

2. Change of status (credit to audit; or audit to credit) is not allowed without a written request to the Registrar's Office, refer to the University Catalog. All such requests must be submitted no later than the last day of late

registration.

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

COURSE LOAD



A student may enroll in up to fifteen (15) semester credit hours during the 2011 summer term. No more than nine (9) semester credit hours may be taken in any given session.

Undergraduate Full-time Student - A full-time undergraduate student is any student enrolled in twelve (12) semester hours **during a regular summer term.** (See definition of term)

Undergraduate Part-time Student - A part-time undergraduate student is any student enrolled in less than twelve (12) semester hours during the summer term.

Graduate Full-time Student - A full-time graduate student is any student enrolled in nine (9) semester hours during the summer term. (See definition of term).

Graduate Part-time Student - A part-time graduate student is any student enrolled in less than nine (9) semester hours **during the summer term.**

CLASS ATTENDANCE

Students, undergraduate and graduate, are expected to attend promptly all classes and laboratories for which they are registered. All undergraduate courses (101 to 499 level) and all graduate courses (500 to 800 level) meet on the days specified in the schedule.

Credit will **not** be granted to any student who **accumulates** in excess of **three (3) class hours** during the conduct of any course. **Classes missed because of late registration are counted as absences.** Individual cases will be decided by the instructor involved and the approval of the Director of Summer School.

COURSE CANCELLATION

The Office of Summer School at South Carolina State University reserves the right to cancel any courses with insufficient enrollment or for other reasons, and to change the arrangement and time of courses, requirements, and other regulations affecting students without prior notice.



REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

All degree requirements must be met regarding entrance, quality and quantity credits, and length of residence as set forth in the University catalog(s). Students who have earned two (2) hours credit in required three-hour courses may be asked to take an additional course in that field to satisfy requirements.

Students who expect to complete all requirements necessary for graduation at the close of the summer term, must make formal application for the degree to the Registrar's Office on or before **July 1, 2011**. Applications are available in the Registrar's Office or on the [Graduate Information Page](#) on the University Website. Persons completing requirements for the degree at the end of the summer will have the degree awarded at the December convocation. The degree will be posted for the term the application is filed. For full information concerning degrees, consult Undergraduate and Graduate University Catalogs.

GRADE REPORTS

GRADES AND SYMBOLS

Grades are recorded for students who are officially enrolled taking courses for credit. Final grades for Summer School courses are recorded as letters not as numbers. The schedule of letter grades and the numerical equivalents are presented below for the benefit of Non-South Carolina State University students whose academic institutions use a numerical system.

South Carolina State University employs a quality point system as indicated above. The quality points are obtained by multiplying the number of credits attempted by the value assigned to the grade earned, (e.g., English [3 credits] with an A grade merits 12 quality points.)

REMOVAL OF INCOMPLETE GRADES

An incomplete award which is not removed within one year after the grade, automatically becomes an F. The last day for instructors to remove an incomplete grade is published in the University Calendar for each semester.

TRANSCRIPTS

Transcripts will be mailed out upon request after the summer term is completed. Students should submit the transcript request form to the Registrar’s Office. EACH TRANSCRIPT IS \$10.00. THE FEE MUST BE PAID AT THE CASHIER’S OFFICE at (803) 536-8885/8529 BEFORE THE TRANSCRIPT CAN BE PREPARED. THE UNIVERSITY DOES NOT FAX TRANSCRIPTS.

All fees, room charges, etc. are payable at the time of registration. PAYMENT CANNOT BE DEFERRED DURING THE SUMMER TERM. CASH, MONEY ORDERS, CASHIER’S CHECKS, OR CREDIT CARDS (VISA OR MASTER CARD) ARE ACCEPTED.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) Notification of Rights

The federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords students certain rights with respect to their education records. They are:

1. The right to inspect and review the student's education records, subject to certain specific exceptions. A student wishing to review his/her education records should submit to the registrar, academic dean or other appropriate official a written request that identifies the records he/she wishes to inspect. The University official will make arrangements for access and notify the student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. If the records are not maintained by the University official to whom the request was submitted, that official will advise the student of the correct official to whom the request should be addressed

2. The right to request the amendment of the student's education records. A student may ask the University to amend a record that he/she believes is inaccurate or misleading. The student should write the University official responsible for the record, clearly identifying the part of the record he/she wants changed and specifying how it is inaccurate or misleading. If the University decides not to amend the record as requested by the student, the University will notify the student of the decision and advise the student of his/her right to a hearing as well as the hearing procedures.

3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without the student's consent. One exception is disclosure to other University officials who have been determined to have a legitimate educational interest in the information. A University official is a person employed by the University in an administrative, supervisory, academic, research, or support staff position; a person or company with whom the University has contracted (such as an attorney, auditor, or collection agent); a person serving on the Board of Trustees or a student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another University official in performing his/her duties.

A University official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to perform his/her official duties. Upon request, the University also discloses education records without the student's consent to:

- University officials with legitimate educational interest;
- Other schools to which a student is transferring;
- Specified officials for audit or evaluation purposes; attorney
- Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
- Organizations conducting certain studies for or on behalf of the school; Accrediting organizations;
- To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena;
- Appropriate officials in cases of health and safety emergencies; and
- State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific State law.

In addition, directory information may be disclosed without a student's consent unless the student has advised the registrar in writing that he/she wishes to restrict access to this information. "Directory Information" includes:

- Student's name
- Participation in officially recognized activities and sport
- Address & Telephone listing
- Weight and height of members of athletic teams
- Electronic mail address
- Photograph
- Degrees, honors, and awards received
- Date and place of birth
- Major field of study
- Dates of attendance
- Grade level
- The most recent educational agency or institution attended

4. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning the University's alleged failure to comply with FERPA. The name and address of the office that administers FERPA is Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, 400 Maryland Avenue, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20202- 4605.

USE YOUR ADVANTAGE

DON'T WAIT until the last day to register. You may be unable to get the classes you want and if you register during late registration you will be required to pay a \$200.00 late registration fee.

DON'T DELAY ~ Students who have not attended and those who have not attended during the past semester should complete and submit an application or readmit application for admission by **May 31, 2011**.

KEEP IN MIND FEE PAYMENT DEADLINE ~ All students are required to pay full tuition and fees or have completed Financial Aid or deferment to cover these charges by May 16, 2011 (Session I & Full Term) June 22, 2011 (Session II) to avoid a late registration fee.

CAPP for Students

What is CAPP-Curriculum Advising and Program Planning?

CAPP is an advising tool used by students, faculty and the Staff of the Registrar's Office to evaluate coursework against degree requirements. CAPP produces a report reflecting academic progress toward completion of an undergraduate degree in the student's declared or proposed major. The CAPP degree evaluation report shows how SC State courses, transfer courses, and courses in-progress apply towards degree requirements. Also, coming soon for Graduate Students.

Important Reminders

- CAPP degree evaluations are not official. For undergraduate students, final approval for graduation is determined by the Registrar's Office in collaboration with academic departments. For graduate students by the School of Graduate Studies.
- CAPP degree evaluation does not take the place of regular academic advising with your academic advisor.
- CAPP degree evaluation does not take the place of personal tracking of your degree progress as outlined in the University Catalog - [University Catalog](#)

Who can use the CAPP degree evaluation?

All degree seeking students and current faculty and/or staff can advise students.

Why are some courses hyperlinked on my degree evaluation and some are not? How can I see the descriptions for all courses in my program?

The system only hyperlinks courses that you have not yet taken and that are specifically required (i.e., not part of a list of several courses) for your program as designated in the online [University Catalog](#). Click the hyperlinked course for a course description.

What is a “What-If” Evaluation?

The “What-If” option allows you to run an evaluation of any program and major. Students who matriculated prior to fall 2005 can select fall 2005 as the Entry Term.

What does the “Entry Term” mean? What does the “Evaluation Term” mean?

The “Entry Term” is the fall semester of the catalog year your requirements will be evaluated against. For example, students entering from fall 2005 up to, but not including spring 2009, would use an “Entry Term” of fall 2005, 200610. The “Evaluation Term” is the term you expect to graduate.

Why is the Expected Graduation Date on the evaluation incorrect?

At SC State, the date does not always reflect the actual Expected Graduation Date and should be ignored. The Expected Graduation Date is set a number of years beyond the current semester so that loan companies do not put students into repayment status.

How does CAPP decide where to place the courses I have completed?

CAPP processes your courses chronologically, based on a “best-fit” approach and the way the requirements are defined. It will look through each of your courses, and then assign each course to the first requirement in your degree program that the course will fulfill.

Does the CAPP evaluation include in-progress courses?

Yes. CAPP includes all courses in which a student is registered.

Some requirements have “and” or “or” next to them. What does this mean?

A requirement with an “or” beside it means that you can take the requirement that is listed next to or the one listed above it. A requirement with an “and” next to it means that you must take both the requirement that is listed next to and the one above it.

What happens to a course when I receive an “I” (incomplete) grade?

Courses with incomplete grades appear as unused on the evaluation until a final grade has been recorded. Then the course will be used appropriately.

What do I do if CAPP lists my major incorrectly?

Please notify the Registrar’s Office if your major is listed incorrectly. To change a major, students must complete a Change of Major Form with all required signatures and submit Form to the Registrar’s Office http://www.scsu.edu/files/Registrars_Office/ChangeMajor.pdf.

I can only process my evaluation on one major at a time. What if I am a double major?

To evaluate a second major, use the “What-If Analysis” as noted above.

I have not declared my major yet, how can I be sure I am on track with my prospective major?

Use the “What-If Analysis” to evaluate your coursework against any major program available.

What is the overall GPA that is listed on the first page of the evaluation?

The overall grade point average is your cumulative grade point average.

SWIMMING



The schedule for youth and adult instructional swimming is printed in the timetable as a part of the listing of courses in the Department of Health and Physical Education. Two sessions, **June 13 to June 25, 2011, June 27 to July 9, and July 5 to July 23** will be offered. The Instructional Swimming courses are designed for individuals desiring to learn the basic strokes of swimming. The courses also develop cardiovascular endurance and improve competitive swimming skills. **No refunds for swimming classes will be given.**

All children who enroll in swimming classes must be at least six years of age. A child who cannot stand on the bottom of the shallow area of the pool with his/her head above water will not be allowed to enroll in the swimming classes. The only exceptions will be determined by the Aquatic Director. All children participating in the instructional swimming classes must present a medical eligibility form to the Aquatic Director prior to entering the pool.

Special Note: Class sizes are limited; therefore, classes will be filled on a first come-first served basis.

CAMPUS RECREATION TENTATIVE

Recreational swimming for Faculty/Staff is scheduled for 5:50 p.m. to 6:15 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. Saturday with University ID. Legal dependents and/or spouses of SC State employees is scheduled for 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. Saturday. Admission is by special permit card which is issued from the Department of Health and Physical Education by the Administrative Coordinator. Cards will be issued to employees beginning **June 8, 2011**. To obtain swimming permits, faculty and staff are required to present a current employee identification card to the Department of Health and Physical Education. In turn, the Office of Human Resource Management will verify eligibility of the request. Visiting relatives, (e.g., grandchildren, nieces, nephews, etc.) are not eligible to participate in the recreational swimming for the faculty, staff, and youth program. No cards will be issued after **June 10, 2011**.

Recreational swimming for Summer School students (8:00 p.m. - 8:45 p.m.), faculty, and staff is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. to 6:15 p.m., Monday through Thursday and also Faculty/Staff and Family 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and students 11:00 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturday. For entrance to the pool a SC State ID is required. A special Faculty/Staff Fitness Swim will be held Monday through Thursday from 6:15 to 7:00 p.m. at the cost of \$25 per session.

UNATTENDED CHILDREN

Parents are strongly urged not to leave young children and youths unattended on the campus during the summer term, because the University cannot assume the responsibility for their care and protection. GRADUATE STUDIES

ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS AND PROCEDURES

1. Graduate study is significantly different from undergraduate study, particularly in its focus on independent inquiry and scholarly pursuit of new knowledge in highly-specialized fields of study. Therefore, admission into the School of Graduate Studies is primarily dependent upon the applicant's demonstrated ability to pursue scholarly work, research, and writing at the rigorous level required in advanced study. The Admissions and Retention Committee of the School of Graduate Studies is responsible for reviewing the application file of each degree-seeking applicant (doctoral, master's, or specialist) and for recommending to the dean of the School of Graduate Studies for admission into "Full," "Nondegree" or "Conditional" standing or nonadmission. The Committee's recommendations are based on, but not limited to, completeness of required documentation, undergraduate academic record, relevance of past undergraduate and/or graduate study, MAT, GRE, GMAT, and/or PRAXIS test scores, and professional recommendations. An applicant is eligible to register and pursue graduate courses within the limits of his/her admissions status only after receiving official notification of the Committee's recommendation(s) in a letter signed by the dean of the School of Graduate Studies.

ENROLLMENT STATUS

New master's level applicants may be admitted to the following statuses and each must follow instructions for the specific status found in the **Graduate Catalog** and in the letter of admission:

1. **Full Admission** -- limited to degree-seeking applicants who have submitted all credentials and meet all standards as prescribed by the current **Graduate Catalog**.
2. **Nondegree Admission** -- provided for nondegree-seeking applicants and, on a temporary basis, for degree seeking students unable to meet filing deadlines with all required credentials. Nondegree students may not be eligible for financial aid.
3. **Conditional Admission** -- allowed for academically deficient applicants (Undergraduate GPA=2.350 to 2.499) as a means of meeting the equivalent of the 2.50 GPA required for all master's programs. Conditionally admitted students may not be eligible for financial aid.

Doctoral and specialist level applicants may be admitted only as follows:

1. **Full Admission** -- limited to applicants to advanced programs only (Ed.D. or Ed.S.) who have furnished all credentials, met all standards as specified in the Graduate Catalog and are eligible to seek admission to one of the advanced degree programs.
2. **Nondegree Admission (Advanced Level)** -- provided for advanced level applicants who have completed a master's or higher degree, but who have not met all standards for admission to an advanced program. Nondegree students may not be eligible for financial aid.

Other Applicant Categories

1. **Certification Only** -- This status is limited to persons who possess a current educator certificate and a baccalaureate degree, but who seek admission to graduate study for purposes of renewing their educator certificate or adding on another certification area. If a "Certification Only" student decides at a later date to pursue other graduate study in this status, an application for readmission must be submitted. However, if a "Certification Only" student wishes to change to another graduate admission status, he or she must meet all of the School of Graduate Studies and degree program admission standards and submit the requisite credentials. The Chair of the Department of Education is advisor to all "Certification Only" students.

2. **Readmission** -- All students in good academic standing who have not enrolled for one or more semesters must file a readmission form with the Office of Graduate Services not less than 20 working days before the opening date of registration.

The Graduate Studies Program offers fourteen degree programs, The Master of Education (M.ED.) degree has four subject-matter areas: Counselor Education, Elementary Education, Special Education, and Secondary Education, with seven subject-matter concentrations (previously called minors) in the latter. The Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) degree is offered in five specialty areas. The Master of Arts (M.A.) degree is offered in Rehabilitation Counseling and in Speech Pathology and Audiology, and the Master of Science (M.S.) degree may be pursued in Nutritional Sciences, Individual and Family Development, Agribusiness and Transportation. The Master of Business Administration offers options in Agribusiness and Entrepreneurship. The Doctoral (Ed.D.) and Specialist (Ed.S.) degrees are offered in the area of Educational Administration only.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITY

Each graduate student is responsible for the proper and timely completion of all requirements for his/her degree program and for satisfying the general regulations of the university. To assist the student in meeting this responsibility, the University provides copies of the **Graduate Catalog** through the School of Graduate Studies. In addition, degree-seeking students will be assigned an academic advisor by the departmental chair who administers the student's degree program. The dean of the School of Graduate Studies provides enrollment authorization and limited advisement services to conditional and nondegree students, except those seeking certification credit as noted above. The advisor will assist the student in understanding degree requirements, program planning, sequencing, scheduling, registration, etc.; however, the student has final responsibility for fulfilling all degree requirements. In keeping with the significant difference between graduate and undergraduate study, graduate advisement is totally non-paternal. Graduate students are expected to make mature independent choices based on thorough study and understanding of school and program regulations. Minimal coaching will be provided by advisors to ensure understanding, but students, not advisors, must accept the logical consequences of their own choices.

Application Filing Deadlines: Each degree seeking applicant is responsible for following the detailed instructions on the Application for Graduate Admission form available through the School of Graduate Studies, Attention: Graduate Admissions, South Carolina State University, 300 College Street, NE, Orangeburg, SC 29117. The application for admission and all required credentials must be submitted no later than June 15, for the fall semester; November 1, for the spring; and April 1, for the summer sessions. **All applicants for graduate credit** (degree or nondegree) must initially complete the standard Application for Graduate Admission.

COURSE LOAD

A full student load consists of 9 semester hours during any academic term. Registration for more than 12 hours in during the full summer term must be approved by the student's advisor and the dean of the School of Graduate Studies.

Full-time Students - A full-time graduate student is enrolled in 9 semester hours during any academic term.

Part-time Students - A part-time graduate student is any student enrolled in less than 9 semester hours during any academic term.

Instructions to Access Blackboard™

Q: What is Blackboard™ (Bb)?

A: **Blackboard™** is a learning management system (commonly abbreviated as LMS). Blackboard is used by SC State University to aide in the administration, documentation, tracking, and reporting of training or educational programs.

Q: How do you access Blackboard™ (Bb) at SC State?

A: Visit: <http://scsu.blackboard.com> and click on the User Login button. All of the courses for which you are registered will be listed within the “MY COURSES” tab.

Note: Bb student user accounts are automatically generated via the course registration and enrollment process. This means that any currently registered student should be able to access the Blackboard system using the login credentials (Username and Password) included in your university account.

Q: What if you don’t know your University login credentials?

A: From the Bb gateway page (<http://scsu.blackboard.com>), follow the instructions under “**Student Login Information**”. To resolve issues associated with your username and/or password, you must contact the IT Services Help Desk using the information found at <http://www.scsu.edu/Accounts> and/or send a request to helpdesk@scsu.edu.

Q: What if you can login to Blackboard™ (Bb), but don’t see link(s) in the “My Courses” tab to the course(s) in which you’re officially registered?

A: All of the courses for which you are registered should be listed within the “MY COURSES” tab. If that is not the case, then you should first login to your Bulldog Connection account (available at <https://luminis422.scsu.edu/cp/home/displaylogin>) to verify that you are in fact registered for those course(s).

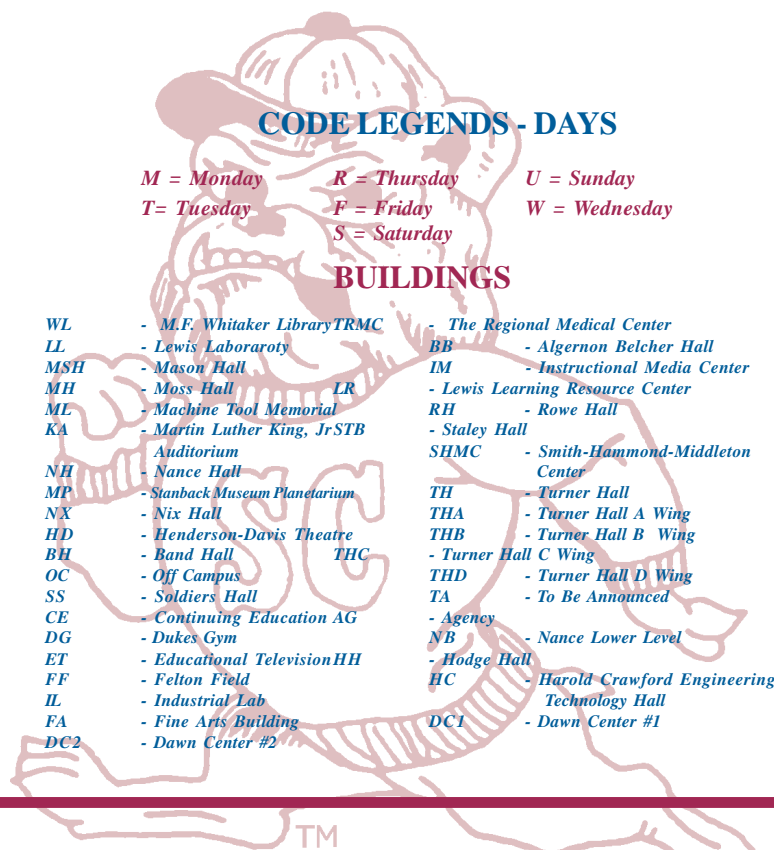
